Midori Brings Her Musical Artistry to Children in Two NYC Communities

Midori & Friends—a nonprofit organization that provides music education programs to underserved public school children throughout New York City—announces two special community-based concerts for children performed by renowned violinist and founder of the organization, **Midori**.

Each year, Midori enjoys spending as much time and energy as possible visiting Midori & Friends partner schools and community agencies so that she can personally perform for and speak with children within their communities. On **February 27th**, Midori will visit **P.S. 229 in Woodside, Queens**, and **NewYork-Presbyterian Morgan Stanley Children's Hospital in Washington Heights**.

The performances are part of a series of *Adventure Concerts* that Midori & Friends presents at its partner schools and community agency sites across New York City's five boroughs, in service of its mission to inspire children through music.

In addition to engaging them with her extraordinary classical violin playing, Midori will provide explanations about her instrument and her playing technique. At P.S. 229, she will also listen to performances by students participating in Midori & Friends programs. Children in both the school and hospital audiences will share the joy of music with Midori as she plays for them and talks about why music is so important.

With these neighborhood concerts on February 27th, Midori reaffirms a commitment of nearly twenty years to engaging underserved communities through music—a commitment for which she

was honored last month with the World Economic Forum's prestigious Crystal Award, presented at their annual conference in Davos, Switzerland.

Increasingly recognized as an educator and music education advocate, Midori has taken extraordinary measures to insure that children in disadvantaged communities have access to music programs and the experience of making music. She recently articulated the philosophy in her acceptance speech at Davos:

"I believe music brings us together, and teaching music to children and providing them with access to creative outlets can, and will, have a beneficial impact on our future as a global society. Music allows us to communicate and express ourselves, enriching our lives in extraordinary and necessary ways."

About Midori

Midori made her debut as a violin soloist at the age of 11 with the New York Philharmonic under the direction of conductor Zubin Mehta, and made her first recording at the age of 14. Today, she is recognized not only for the evolution and scope of her 30-year career as one of the most dazzlingly gifted performers before the public, but increasingly for the prescient and innovative community engagement initiatives to which she devotes a substantial amount of her energies and resources worldwide on an ongoing basis. Named a Messenger of Peace by U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon in 2007, she has created a new model for young artists who seek to balance the joys and demands of a performing career at the highest level with a hands-on investment in the power of music to change lives.

Now in her 8th year as Jascha Heifetz Chair at the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music and her 5th year as Chair of its Strings Department, Midori thrives amidst the challenges presented by her full-time career as educator and administrator at a major university. To these commitments she adds ongoing, hands-on involvement in the four community engagement organizations she has founded: Midori & Friends, Partners in Performance, Orchestra Residencies Program, and Music Sharing (in Japan).
